### ALL ABOUT HAP

HAP is a subsidiary of Henry Ford Health, one of Michigan's leading health care systems. Founded in 1960, HAP provides health insurance plans for individuals, companies and organizations of all sizes. Our product lines include coverage for employer group plans, individual plans, Medicare Advantage, Medicaid and self-funded plans. We regard our mission as the enhancement of the health and well-being of the thousands of lives we touch every year.

HAP covers 430,000 lives in Michigan, whom we call our members. In 2022, HAP greatly expanded its geographic reach westward, enabling our Community Outreach team to include organizations in Grand Rapids and nearby communities. We also added health care providers with this growth as well, now peaking at more than 50,000 provider partners.

HAP is governed by a diverse volunteer board of directors representing a variety of industries that include health care, automotive/manufacturing, financial services, education, professional services, consumer services and community planning.

Our subsidiaries and business partnerships include Alliance Health and Life Insurance Company, ASR Health Benefits, HAP Empowered Health Plan and Health Alliance Administrators, Inc.

HAP is known for our community giving and volunteerism. Our outreach programs focus on wellness, youth, education, diversity, community development, and arts and culture. HAP also offers a variety of wellness programs for preventive care, worksite wellness and digital coaching.

## HAP 2022 PARTNER ORGANIZATIONS

Let's take a look at a few of the organizations HAP assisted in 2022. HAP's Community Outreach team partnered with a total of 265 organizations across the state. All of those we served are examples of groups that positively impact the Social Determinants of Health and align with the goals established by our Community Advisory Committees.

### **Detroit Health Department & HAP Empowered Vaccination Event**

HAP maintains a strategic partnership with the Detroit Health Department. One of the goals for this partnership is to close gaps in health care for many Detroit residents. In July at the Crowell Recreation Center, HAP administered free COVID vaccinations to adults and performed lead testing for neighborhood children. Our partnership with the Detroit Health Department also offers free immunizations and lead-poison screening for children who may not be receiving them with regular doctor visits and builds awareness for

parents about safe sleep habits for babies. HAP conducts raffles at these health events where kids can win bikes and items their families may not be able to afford including tablets and other technology. HAP also teamed up with the Detroit Pistons, giving the kids who attended our event their own basketballs to take home.

































### **Habitat for Humanity**

Habitat for Humanity believes that everyone everywhere should have a healthy, affordable place to call home. This motto aligns well with HAP's mission to create healthier communities. In September in Flint, HAP partnered with Habitat for Humanity to do what that organization does best – build houses. Also, throughout 2022, HAP joined with Henry Ford Health and Habitat for Humanity

to support the Return Home Safe program. This organization identifies at-risk seniors returning from the hospital who require minor home repairs. The goal is to enable them to keep living in their homes and continue to be part of their community once they leave the hospital. This program exists to reduce falls, injuries, emergency visits and hospital admissions for those aged 65 and older.





### OneSight

HAP partnered with OneSight Essilor Luxottica Foundation and EyeMed for a two-day vision clinic at Kipps Academy on Detroit's Westside in August 2022. Among the benefits for community residents were free eye exams and eyeglasses made on the spot for people of all ages. Most of those served that day had never received an eye exam. OneSight completed more than 240 exams over the two-day event.







### **Cass Community Social Services**

One of our strategic partners, Cass Community Social Services, works across the City of Detroit in areas of concentrated poverty, providing programs for food, health, housing and jobs. We work with Cass Community monthly to assist with meal preparation and then serve the meals to area residents. Throughout the year, HAP volunteers help alleviate chronic food insecurity by providing as many as 200 meals per month to the hungry.

### Meals on Wheels/Grand Rapids and Food Pantry/Flint

Our relationship with Meals on Wheels in Grand Rapids is a new one and developed as a result of our expansion into more Michigan counties. In September, with the launch of our West Michigan expansion, more than 30 HAP employees volunteered at two Grand Rapids locations to wrap food deliveries and help with a variety of food prep. Our \$10,000 donation to Meals on Wheels in Grand Rapids helped them pay for a new cooler and shelving units in their facility. In November, we worked with Meals on Wheels to deliver Thanksgiving meals to those who regularly receive the group's services.

In January, to mark Martin Luther King Day, our HAP Flint team met at the Food Bank of Eastern Michigan to support the Hurley Food Farmacy. Volunteers cleaned, labeled, sorted and boxed food and non-food items that were distributed to partner agencies. HAP volunteers bagged nearly 23,000 bags of food in only two hours. HAP has been working with the Hurley Foundation for many years, building awareness to feed and care for Flint residents who need help.







### **The NOAH Project Detroit**

HAP sponsors monthly events with the NOAH Project in Detroit. The NOAH Project is dedicated to ending homelessness. It serves as a central hub for services for those who are on the path to stable housing. One step in this process is to ensure people have food security, and HAP volunteers work alongside NOAH Project staff to prepare lunches. In April, they filled more than 200 lunch bags to feed those who have no kitchen in which to prepare their own lunches.







### **Detroit Public School Community District (DPSCD)**

In March, HAP donated \$75,000 to the Detroit Public School Community District (DPSCD) Foundation to purchase all-weather coats and personal care items for students. More than 1,900 coats were purchased and more than 35 schools in the district received coat donations. In December, HAP donated washers and dryers to three DPSCD elementary and middle schools. Many children who attend these schools don't have access to clean clothes, including many Medicaid-eligible families. Our donation will help to meet that need.











### Izzo Legacy Walk with Michigan State University

More than 1,000 people were on hand in April for the Michigan State University (MSU) Izzo Legacy Walk. Named for MSU basketball coach Tom Izzo, this event features a variety of walks and runs for adults and children. HAP and MSU Health Care joined forces in 2021 to promote Medicare Advantage plans as an extension of the Henry Ford Health/MSU relationship. This is another way HAP increases awareness for healthy living throughout Michigan.





## HAP FUNDRAISING ACTIVITIES

### **GAME ON CANCER**

Game on Cancer (GOC) is a unique partnership among the Detroit Lions, the Detroit Pistons, Henry Ford Health and other corporate partners to raise awareness and funds for patients of the Henry Ford Cancer Institute.

In 2022, GOC was supercharged with activities and fundraising. **Game on Cancer Field Day in December** enabled families to visit with Detroit Lions players and legends, play football in a youth zone and participate in other on-field football clinics. **The MoGo bike share program in 2022** also raised money for Game on Cancer. Numerous bikes carry the HAP and Henry Ford Health logos, and HAP donates to GOC each time a photo of one of these bikes is shared on social media.

Every penny raised in GOC helps patients-in-need pay for essentials like housing, food, utility bills, transportation to appointments and similar needs while also supporting critical programs and cancer research. HAP employees purchased donated items in a silent auction as well just before the holiday season, raising \$8,000 for GOC.







### **CRIM**

The HAP/Crim Festival of Races is held every August in Flint. It is named for former Michigan House Speaker Bobby Crim who launched the idea in 1977 as a way to encourage a healthier mindset for area residents.

Today, it is a highly regarded nonprofit organization that impacts the lives of thousands. HAP is the primary sponsor and supports the Crim Fitness Foundation year-round to promote healthy lifestyles for people who live in Flint and Genesee counties. For example, HAP also supports the Bishop Airport 5K run for the Crim Foundation every October. The Crim Foundation currently serves nearly 40,000 people each year and HAP is proud to be such an important part of this program.









### **HEART WALK**

Henry Ford Health (HFH) and HAP sponsor the Heart Walk in Metro Detroit each year.

In June, HAP and HFH partnered to become the top fundraising organization for the American Heart Association Heart Walk. Together, HAP and HFH raised more than \$280,000. There were more than 140 HAP walkers in the event. Co-chairs for the 2022 walk were Denise Brooks-Williams, SVP and CEO for HFH North Market, and Dr. Michael Genord, president and CEO of HAP and EVP of HFH. The Heart Walk is focused on funding groundbreaking research and lifesaving programs for those who suffer from heart disease. Metro Detroit Heart Walk is one of 300 such walks held in communities across the U.S. annually.

### **ADOPT-A-FAMILY**

Every year, HAP adopts families to help them enjoy their holiday season with gifts purchased by donations from HAP employees.

In 2022, HAP adopted 12 families - nine through Carriage Town Ministries, a rescue mission in Flint; two through Oakland Family Services in Pontiac; and one HAP member family in Detroit. HAP employees in Troy and Flint bought gifts and wrapped them for these families. Children received coats, books, boots, hats, socks and toys.
